## TRACKING YOUR REQUIREMENTS

The General Liberal Education Requirement is part of the liberal arts focus of the University. Every student must complete 12 Arts and Science courses including four courses from List I: Fine Arts and Humanities, four courses from List II: Social Sciences, and four courses from List III: Sciences. Required courses in your program can be used to meet the GLER. No more than four courses from any one department may be used to meet this requirement. For complete details about the G LER, see the 2011/ 2012 C alendar p. 85.

A cognate is a course from outside a defined discipline which complements and enhances the breadth of knowledge and skills found within the area of study.

A prerequisite is a course that you must have completed with at least a 'D,' 'Credit,' or 'Pass' before you are eligible to register in a given course. A corequisite is a course that you must take prior to or concurrently with the course in which you want to register. Recommended background is a course or courses that you are advised to take before you register in a particular course, but you are not required to do so. Prerequisites, corequisites, and recommended background are listed for each course in the C alendar and the Timetable and Registration Guide. Remember that you must follow the current Calendar for prerequisites, corequisites, and recommended background.

An Independent Study is a course that consists of individual study for course credit under the supervision of a professor and may be completed at the 2000, 3000, or 4000 level. Independent Study may take a variety of forms including library research, laboratory research projects, or field study. You may complete a maximum of five Independent Study courses. For further information, students should consult the Department or Faculty member under whom they wish to pursue an independent study.

An A pplied Study course is an employment or volunteer arrangement for which students may be granted course credit. Students should see the Coordinator of Applied Studies for specific information (AH 154 | phone: 403-382-7154).

You are allowed to repeat a course. The grades for both attempts are recorded on the transcript, but only the grade and credit hours for the most recent attempt are computed in the GPA. Students may not have grades and credit hours for more than one attempt calculated in the GPA. W hen you repeat a course, you must submit a Repeated Course Form to the Registrar's 0 ffice and Student Services (RO SS) so that your GPA will be recalculated using the new grade. A student may not use a Credit/N on-Credit designation to replace a previously earned grade.

If you exceed any course limits (e.g., take too many Activity, Independent Study, or Introductory courses), or take two courses that are substantially similar, you will need to complete more than the minimum number of courses for your program. For example, if you happen to take 11 courses at the 1000 level you will need to complete a total of 41 courses for your degree. Please contact an A cademic Advisor for more information.
