Admission

Admission to the Faculty occurs after completion of the following ten Year One courses (30.0 credit hours):

- Economics 1010
- Economics 1012
- Statistics 1770
- Any seven Arts and Science courses (21.0 credit hours) at the 1000/2000 level

Additionally, a minimum cumulative grade point average at or above the current admission cut-off must be achieved (2.50 for Fall 2004).

Students are cautioned to examine the course sequencing on the reverse side of this Program Planning Guide in order to include the appropriate courses in Year One. Admission to Management programs is based on academic achievement prior to admission. **Students who intend to enter the Faculty of Management must submit an Application form before the deadline. Minimum Grade Requirement

A minimum grade of 'C-' is required in Statistics 1770; Economics 1010 and 1012; Writing 1000 OR a university English course; all courses marked with an asterisk (*); and all Management courses in order to meet degree requirements.

Not more than 10 courses may be taken at the 1000 level for credit toward the degree.

Residence Requirement

All students must complete at least 20 University of Lethbridge courses, 10 of which must be 3000/4000-level Management courses.

Notes

* Prerequisite: Mathematics 30 or Pure Mathematics 30, Mathematics 0500, or Applied Mathematics 30 and at least 75% standing in Athabasca University's Mathematics 101.

** Credit is not allowed for both Management 2060 and Computer Science 1000.

FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT CAMPUSES

The Faculty of Management offers courses on three campuses: Lethbridge, Calgary, and Edmonton. On the Calgary and Edmonton campuses, the University of Lethbridge guarantees only those courses for the Post-Diploma Bachelor of Management degree in the programs/majors identified below:

- Accounting
- General Management
- Human Resource Management and Labour Relations
- Qualifying Program

Students may opt to take Summer Session courses which may reduce the overall length of time required to complete the degree.

Sequencing of courses will vary for part-time students.

All courses in this major may not be offered every semester. Students should consult current Timetables.
