### Faculty of Arts and Science: General Social Sciences

#### About the General Major in the Social Sciences

The General Major in the Social Sciences is designed to provide a broad major that supports the ideal of liberal education without sacrificing focus and depth unduly. Students are strongly encouraged to choose Social Science disciplines that are school subject areas or are taught in the provincial curriculum.

#### Choosing an Education Major

The Faculty of Education offers 11 different majors that correspond to teaching subjects in Alberta schools (see p. 165 in the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). In highly competitive teaching majors, the GPA for admission may be above the minimum requirements. If you are developing a *General major in Arts and Science and a Native Education major in Education*, you must also develop a teaching minor, and you must complete Professional Semester II in that subject and Professional Semester III in Native Education. At least five courses in your teaching minor must be completed in time for admission to the Faculty of Education.

#### Choosing Courses Outside the Major

Students sometimes find that their initial objective to teach only at the elementary level or only at the secondary school level is later modified—or even completely changed. Students are therefore encouraged to select courses that will prepare them for teaching in a variety of situations. Moreover, students should select courses that not only provide breadth and richness for the classroom but also provide the basis for the development of a teaching minor or specialization.

#### Choosing an Education Minor

The Faculty of Education offers 19 minors (see p. 170 in the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). Students may use the same courses to fulfill the minor and the General Liberal Education Requirement (GLER). Native Education majors **must declare a minor**, which includes seven non-Education courses in a school subject and an appropriate Education methods course (see Section 5.a.3. Minors for Native Education Majors, p. 165, in the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar).

## General Major in the Social Sciences/ Native Education

# Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Education

<b>Program Requirements</b>	The B.A./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program with a General Major in the Social Sciences/Native Education requires 50 courses, including 30 Arts and Science courses and 20 Education courses. Courses for the General Major in the Social Sciences will be chosen from three separate disciplinary streams or subject areas. Sixteen courses are required in the major.
<b>Disciplinary Streams</b>	You are required to do seven courses in your first disciplinary stream, which must be Native American Studies. An additional four courses are required in each of your remaining disciplinary streams. School subjects include Anthropology, Economics, Geography, History, Physical Education (Kinesiology), Political Science, and Sociology. Non-school subjects include Archaeology, Psychology, and Women and Gender Studies. You may choose non-school subjects for these streams, but you should understand that the more school subjects you include in your General Major, the better prepared you will be to teach. Your 16th course will be a 'Quantitatively-based Methodology' course (statistics).
<b>Required Minor</b>	This program requires the completion of a seven-course <i>school subject</i> minor.
<b>Transfer Credit</b>	Remember that you may use both University of Lethbridge credit and credit transferred from another college or university to meet degree and major requirements. Transfer credit may be either specified or unspecified. Specified credit is indicated on your transcript by the subject name and the specific number of the course, e.g., Political Science 1000, Geography 2600. Unspecified credit (1XXX, 2XXX, etc.) is indicated by the subject name and the level of the course in parentheses, e.g., Political Science (1000 level), Geography (2000 level).
<b>Unspecified Course Credit</b>	Unspecified course credit means that the University of Lethbridge does not offer the same course you transferred in, but we recognize it and treat it as a regular course. An unspecified course would count as one of your maximum of 17 courses from one department, but it could not meet a specific course requirement. For example, if Economics 2900 is required in your program, you could not use Economics (2000 level) to fulfill that requirement. Students with unspecified transfer credit need to consult an Academic Advisor to establish how the transfer credit fits in the degree program. This should be done as soon as possible after transfer credit is awarded.

**Note:** *The above courses have prerequisites which may or may not be included in the major. Please check the current Calendar to ensure that you have the prerequisite for the course.*

*You may have chosen one of the above disciplines as your second or third disciplinary stream. If, for example, Sociology is one of your disciplines, it would be logical for you to use Sociology 2130 as your quantitatively-based course. However, you must still take four Sociology courses besides 2130. You cannot use the same course as both one of your four in the discipline and as your quantitative course requirement.*

*\*Five of the seven courses are required for admission to the Faculty of Education. Some minors (Drama, Music, Physical Education) have additional admission requirements. A minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.50 out of 4.0 is required on all graded courses comprising the minor for admission and graduation.*

## Sample Sequencing Plan

Shown below is a sample sequence of courses for your degree. If you follow this plan, you should be able to graduate in five years, provided you complete five courses per semester. This is just one example of how you could complete your major and degree requirements; you may find that a different sequence works as well as this one.

**Reminder:** Students must include among the 30 Arts and Science courses at least 20 non-science courses from Lists I and II (2012/2013 Calendar, Part 4, Section 11, p. 91). Students intending to complete a Minor in Science Education or a Minor in Mathematics Education will need to choose elective courses designated as non-science to fulfill this requirement.

### Terms Used

**GLER course:** A course that could count toward the General Liberal Education Requirement. You may use courses in your major towards this 12-course requirement. See the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 4 - Academic Regulations (p. 91) for complete information.

The Faculty of Arts and Science offers Liberal Education 1000 and 2000, specifically designed to introduce first-year students to the wide scope of human knowledge and teach essential university success skills, critical thinking, and integrative thinking (see the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 14 - Courses, p. 320). LBED 1000 and 2000 may be used toward satisfying the GLER.

**Elective:** A course that you may choose freely from all those available and applicable to your program. Use courses inside or outside your major, bearing in mind any restrictions that may apply (e.g., a maximum of 17 courses from any one department).
